



## Live the Liturgy **Inspiration for the Week**

Even as people of faith we often find ourselves reasoning our way through our trials and difficulties. It makes a huge difference using our own eyes and not those of God. God knows that we live in an imperfect world filled with suffering, pain, difficulties, disappointments, and death; all part of the mix. Jesus shows us by example that when we encounter hardships God transforms them into something better.

We do not need to despair. God gives us hope. When we view our lives through God's eyes and not our own this gift of hope and transformation becomes very apparent. We must lose our lives in order to gain them.

## Labor Day Prayer

O God, You asked St. Joseph to accept Your will that his wife-tobe would have a Son. St. Joseph accepted Your will and worked with Jesus as His father and teacher. We seek Your blessing upon all the work of our hands, and we dedicate our work to Your greater glory. We ask Your blessing upon all workers, especially those who work to make our lives easier and more enjoyable. We ask all this through the intercession of St. Joseph, Patron Saint of Workers, in the name of Jesus Your Son, in the unity of the Holy Spirit. Amen. St. Joseph the Worker, pray for us.

#### 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

#### "You are thinking not as God does, but as human beings do." Peter had expressed horror at the prophetic words

announcing that Jesus' suffering and death were imminent. Peter didn't want his friend and teacher to undergo this terrible ordeal. He wanted "no such thing" ever to happen to his Lord. But Jesus sharply rebuked Peter's response, comparing it to that of the tempter, Satan. Just as temptation becomes an obstacle to our doing what is right, so Peter was presenting an obstacle to Christ's mission. Suffering was part of it, like it or not. To deny this difficult element of Christ's work would be to deny the bigger plan of God. And so Jesus rightly told Peter that He wasn't thinking like God thinks.

Of course, since we are human, it's only natural that we should think as human beings do. We, like Peter, tend to recoil at the idea of facing unpleasant or painful circumstances. But clearly God sometimes allows such situations to take place for a greater good.

Today's Gospel challenges us to think "as God does" by holding both of these elements together. Unlike Peter who only focused on the sad part of the story, we are called to recognize the Resurrection on the other side of the Cross, and to be willing to do whatever is necessary to get there. In fact, Jesus tells us later in this Gospel to take up our cross and follow Him. That is not the "human" way of thinking. It's the Godly way. Our natural response is to reject and scorn the trials and tribulations that we face, but Jesus wants us to embrace them patiently and "come after" Him on the (sometimes rough) road to eternal life.

## Why Do We Do That? Catholic Traditions Explained

**Question:** As we celebrate Labor Day, can you tell me about Catholic teaching regarding labor?

Answer: One of the most important principles of Catholic social teaching is the dignity of work and the rights of workers. Four encyclicals address this foundational social teaching: "Rerum Novarum" (1891) by Leo XIII, "Quadragesimo Anno" (1931) by Pius XI, "Laborem Exercens" (1981) and "Centesimus Annus" (1991) by John Paul II. They address both the theology and dignity of work. In Genesis, God takes the initiative in creating the world, calling forth human beings to be faithful stewards of creation. From this perspective, work can be spiritually understood in terms of sharing in God's ongoing activity to build, create, and transform the world. Human beings are co-creators with God. This vocation demands self-discipline.

Besides an exercise in self-discipline, work is also the means by which we develop and fulfill ourselves. In work, we shape the world and our environment. Through work, we also shape ourselves. Pope John Paul II summarized this point in "Laborem Exercens," "The value of human work is not primarily the kind of work being done but the fact that the one who is doing it is a person" (#6). Labor Day offers an excellent opportunity to reflect on how we view work in light of our Catholic social teaching.

### Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary

The Catholic Church celebrates the birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary on its traditional fixed date of September 8, nine months after the December 8 celebration of her Immaculate Conception as the child of Saints Joachim and Anne.

The circumstances of the Virgin Mary's infancy and early life are not directly recorded in the Bible, but other documents and traditions describing the circumstances of her birth are cited by some of the earliest Christian writers from the first centuries of the Church. Saint Augustine described the birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary as an event of cosmic and historic significance, and an appropriate prelude to the birth of Jesus Christ. "She is the flower of the field from whom bloomed the precious lily of the valley," he said.

## XXII Niedziela Zwykła

Kiedy Jezus informuje Apostołów, że będzie cierpiał i zostanie zabity, Piotr robi mu wyrzuty. Nie jest to objaw tchórzostwa, raczej niezrozumienia spraw Bożych. Piotr myśli racjonalnie o przyszłości—boi sie najpierw o życie Jezusa, a dopier potem o siebie i innych uczniów.

Ofiara krzyżowa Jezusa Chrystusa to szczyt tajemnicy Bożego planu zbawienia. Kościół żyje nią stale, ponieważ sprawuje Eucharystię. Tu poznajemy naukę Krzyża, która jest dla nas mądrością i mocą Bożą.

Jezus nie żąda wyrzeczenia się życia, ale przyjęcia go w takiej nowości i pełni, którą tylko On dać może. Człowiek w głębi swojego jestestwa zakorzenił tendencję do "myślenia o sobie samym", umieszczania własnej osoby w centrum spraw jako miary wszystkiego. Kto naśladuje Chrystusa odrzuca jednak to koncentrowanie się na sobie samym i nie ocenia rzeczy w oparciu o własne korzyści. Przeżywa swoje życie w kategoriach daru i bezinteresowności, a nie zdobyczy i posiadania. Życie prawdziwe wyraża się bowiem w darze z siebie, co jest owocem łaski Chrystusa: życie wolne, we wspólnocie z Bogiem i z braćmi. (św. Jan Paweł II)

## Urodziny Matki Bożej

Ewangelia nie mówi o narodzinach Maryi. Po raz pierwszy Maryja występuje u św. Mateusza w rodowodzie Jezusa, i od razu jako Matka Zbawiciela. Dlaczego więc 8 września obchodzimy święto wspominające Jej narodziny? Kościół wspomina wiele wydarzeń, które nie zostały udokumentowane na kartach Pisma Świętego, choćby Wniebowzięcie Najświętszej Maryi Panny. Tradycja, drugi z korzeni Objawienia, daje nam podstawy do obchodzenia Narodzin Matki Zbawiciela. Warto dodać, że w kalendarzu liturgicznym występują tylko trzy czyjeś narodzenia: obok Bożego Narodzenia jest też narodzenie św. Jana Chrzciciela oraz właśnie Matki Bożej.


