Gospel Meditation — Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

"Anyone of you who does not renounce all his possessions cannot be my disciple." It's a modern misconception to think of Jesus as the ultimate nice guy who only said things that everybody loved to hear. Of course Jesus is the perfect model of charity and compassion, but He also gave some very challenging teachings. Today's Gospel is a case in point. Not many people are thrilled by Christ's lesson today that insists God must be first in our lives. Few are those who love to hear this instruction to renounce our beloved things as well as our beloved relationships. But Jesus does not mince words. We are to "hate" our "father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters," and even our own life.

It's important to understand that the use of the word "hate" here does not mean to despise anyone or treat them unkindly. It means rather to prefer something-or Someone-else, namely, God, to these important relationships. Taken in the context of the Gospel as a whole it is clear that Jesus is not advocating cruelty or animosity. On the contrary, just a few weeks ago we heard from Luke 10:27 as Jesus instructed us to love our neighbors as ourselves. However, in putting God first, inevitably something else must take second place. It is a kind of hatred of family, self, and "stuff" when we don't allow these things to become mini-gods in our lives. Instead, we keep God as God.

What does this mean for us? It means not allowing a family member to prevent us from practicing our faith to the fullest, and also not putting our trust in gadgets and gizmos. It means, instead, putting all our trust in God, whatever the cost may be.

The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary

On Thursday, September 8th, we celebrate the birthday of the Mother of God. This 5th century feast marks the anniversary of the dedication of the basilica in Jerusalem, which according to tradition, is the location of the home of St. Anne, mother of the Blessed Virgin Mary. There is also another ancient tradition which states that Our Lady was born in Nazareth.

Therefore let us thank Our Heavenly Mother for her sacrifice and suffering that she allowed to occur because she loves her Son and because she loves each of us.

Let us ask that the grace of God may flow through her and into our souls. May we recognize her great love for us on this special day of September 8, by offering up some act of love to her.

XXIII Niedziela Zwykła

Do wszystkiego, co chcemy przedsięwziąć w naszym życiu, potrzeba odpowiedniego przy-gotowania. Nieraz bardzo starannie planujemy i przygotowujemy się do wielu rzeczy, które nas czekają w niedalekiej lub bardziej odległej przyszłości. Chrystus mówi dzisiaj również o rozsądku, o właściwym planowaniu w naszym życiu wiary. Po prostu, aby się nie łudzić, nie żyć w jakiejś iluzji. Pamiętajmy o tym, co duchowe, a co również wymaga przygotowania, gotowości, planowa-nia.

Przypomina nam się pewne opowiadanie o królu i jego błaźnie. Pewien król lubił bardzo podróżować. Był też dzielnym rycerzem, który prowadził swoje wojsko na podbój okolicznych krajów. Wszyscy go bardzo cenili, bo wiedzieli, że do wszystkich wypraw przygotowuje się bardzo starannie. Błazen zaś zabawiał króla przez wiele lat jego panowania. Szczerze mówiąc król uważał go osobiście za głupca, który na niczym tak naprawdę się nie znał i niczego nie potrafiłby w życiu robić. Dlatego król śmiał się z niego w różnych momentach, a nawet kpił publicznie, gdy było wielu gości. Gdy był bardzo rozbawiony, zwykł wołać do niego "Oj, ty głupcze!". Błazen nie przejmował sie jednak za bardzo złośliwościami króla. Z biegiem czasu król zrobił się stary i zaczęły doskierać mu różne choroby. W pewnym momencie zdał sobie sprawę, że będzie musiał odejść z tego świata i że chwila ta jest już bliska. Wtedy przeraził się bardzo, wiedział bowiem, że nie był zbyt pobożnym władcą. Święto Narodzenia Najświętszej Maryi Panny

Kościół katolicki obchodzi 8 września święto Narodzenia Najświętszej Maryi Panny. Nie wiemy dokładnie, kiedy narodziła się Maryja, a data tego święta wynika z tradycji kultu maryjnego. Świętowane tego wydarzenia niesie głęboką treść teologiczną. Narodzenie Maryi było bezpośrednią zapowiedzią przyjścia Zbawiciela. Ojcowie Kościoła mówili, że Maryja poprzedza przyjście Mesjasza tak jak nastanie jutrzenki zapowiada pełny blask dnia.

W polskiej tradycji dzień 8 września nosi także nazwę święta Matki Bożej Siewnej i jest związany z poświęceniem ziarna na nowy zasiew. Jednym z polskich sanktuariów maryjnych, które obchodzi uroczystości odpustowe w tym dniu, jest Gietrzwałd niedaleko Olsztyna a także bazylika katedralna w Tarnowie.

Why Do We Do That? - Catholic Traditions Explained

<u>Question:</u> On Labor Day, we honor the worker and the role of labor in the social and economic development of our country. What does the Church say about labor?

Labor has been the cornerstone of the social justice teaching of the Church. At the very beginning of the labor movement, Pope Leo XIII wrote an encyclical letter called "Rerum Novarum," that for many years was seen as a masterpiece of work, bringing traditional Catholic teaching to the new problems that the Industrial Revolution brought to the workplace. In fact, this document was so significant that later popes issued encyclicals on its anniversary: Pope Pius XI wrote "Quadragesimo Anno" and St. John XXIII, "Mater et Magistra." Paul VI issued "Octagesima Adveniens," and St. John Paul II wrote "Laborem Exercens" and "Centesimus Annus." More recently, Benedict XVI added his voice with "Caritas in Veritate" in 2009, while Pope Francis has made the dignity of the worker a hallmark of his pontificate. Throughout these writings the teaching of the Church remains consistent concerning the dignity of workers, the right to a fair wage, the importance of housing, and the duty to take care of those who are in need. In 1967, Pope Paul VI wrote in "Populorum Progressio" that work "is something willed and approved by God... God gave man intelligence, sensitivity and the power of thought--tools with which to finish and perfect the work He began. Every worker is, to some extent, a creator--be he artist, craftsman, executive, laborer or farmer" (#27).
