

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

Unity. What does "unity" mean? For those of us who claim Christ as our model of living and Savior of humanity, it means we are one. This year the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity has as its theme the Scripture citation 2 Corinthians 5:14-20. The first line contains our mission statement... "For the Love of Christ impels us, once we have come to the conviction that one died for all; therefore all have died." If that is not a mandate for unity, then there is none. We are one in the death of Christ and therefore live in unity with all other Christians.

God, who are Unity in Three Holy Persons--Father, Son, and Holy Spirit-- you have called us to live in peace with all people. You have also called us to work toward unity in purpose to spread the Gospel to all nations. Graciously give us the courage and strength to work toward unity, and act toward each other as brothers and sisters.

The Baptism of the Lord

Think of what it's like to wait a long time. Can you imagine what it would be like to wait for centuries? No one person lives that long, of course. But for the Israelites, they had heard the stories from generation to generation. They had been conquered time and time again, and now "the people were filled with expectation, and all were asking in their hearts whether John might be the Christ." They had been waiting for a Messiah, one who did miraculous deeds and said profound things; someone aglow with the glory of God. We all know what it's like to hope and be disappointed. But what if your hopes were fulfilled?

That day at the Jordan River, an audience had gathered. Among the crowd for Baptism was an unknown man. Perhaps He was dirty from weeks in the desert. His hands had the calloused palms of a tradesman, a carpenter. He and John the Baptist may have embraced with the familiarity of the cousins they were. This Man wades into the Jordan for a good, solid dunking. As He rises from the water, the One who breathed life into Adam gasps for air like any other man.

But then "heaven was opened." The clouds in the sky part miles above. "And the Holy Spirit descended upon Him in bodily form like a dove." An apparition with substance sails through the sky. It exudes gentleness and power all at once. "And a voice came from heaven, 'You are My Beloved Son; with You I am well pleased." Can you imagine the sight? For the crowd, there is no doubting what they have seen, who they have seen. Can you imagine this encounter with our God who keeps His promises? What are you waiting for?

Why Do We Do That? Catholic Traditions Explained

Question: Why do we baptize infants when the Bible says "repent and be baptized"? How can an infant repent? **Answer:** When you take a trip, you do not wait until you run out of gas before you fill the tank--at least not on purpose! You fill your tank and pack your bags as you anticipate a trouble-free journey. We can make a similar case for the baptism of children as they begin their spiritual journey. In the early Church, only adults were baptized when they professed faith in Jesus as the Messiah. As the Church grew, children were baptized and raised in faith. The Bible does not limit baptism to adults. Several passages point to infant baptism. Jesus said, "Let the children come to me and do not hinder them," while Paul would baptize people "and their household." He did not limit baptism to adults. Ultimately, our whole life is an act of repentance, a continual struggle to turn from sin and be faithful to the Gospel. We believe that Baptism is more than a symbolic act of faith. It forgives original sin as well as personal sin, and brings us into the Church, where we begin our journey of faith.

Święto Chrztu Pańskiego

Świętujemy dzisiaj uroczyste rozpoczęcie publicznego życia Jezusa. Podczas Chrztu w Jordanie Jezus zostaje ukazany jako Mesjasz i umiłowany Syn Boga. Każdy, który przyjął chrzest Duchem Świętym staje się umiłowanym dzieckiem Boga. Chrzest jest zanurzeniem człowieka w nowej sytuacji i w nowej rzeczywistości.

Przez chrzest człowiek otrzymuje prawo do należenia do innego świata. Przez chrzest zostaliśmy zanurzeni w Chrystusie. Wyjściem ze zwyczajności i ukrycia można nazwać dzień Chrztu Chrystusa w Jordanie. Pierwsze spotkanie Jezusa i Jana dokonało się wtedy, gdy żyli jeszcze pod sercami swych matek, gdy Maryja spotkała się z Elżbietą. Świadkami ponownego spotkania jesteśmy dziś my, gdy przyjmuje Chrzest z rąk Jana w Jordanie. Wszystko jest w nim wyjątkowe: rozwarte niebo i Duch zstępujący na Chrystusa i głos Ojca.

Niech te znaki jeszcze bardziej umocnią naszą wiarę w Chrystusie – Sługę, w którym Bóg ma upodobanie.

Most organizations donate food to those in need ONLY during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. Then, typically after this time, donations to the Food Cupboard drop




